



about Kuala Lumpur's recreational parks?

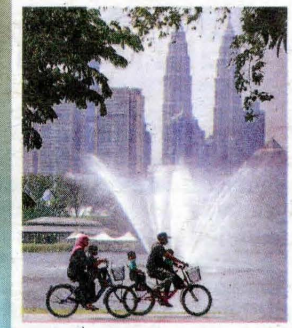
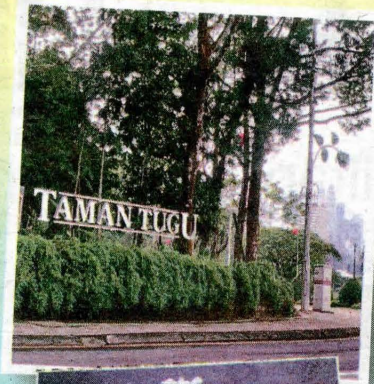
Parks in the city play a role as an environment purifier, preserving wildlife and plant life as well as keeping the city folk healthy.

Besides jogging and cycling at **Taman Tasik Titivangsa**, a former tin mine, visitors can also play tennis, rollerblade, go boating or even ride horses here.

The 95ha **Kepong Metropolitan Park**, which has a man-made lake, is one of the largest recreational parks in the country.

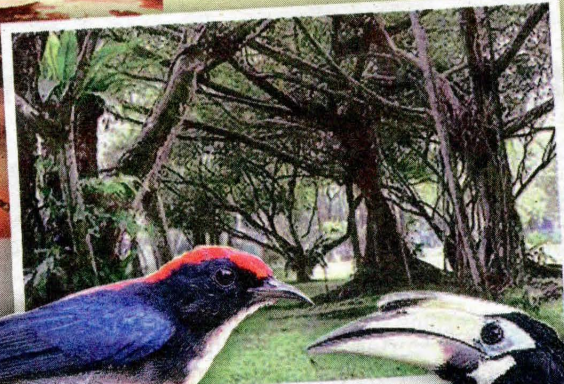
Next is **Taman Rimba Kiara**, the "best-frequented green spaces" in the city where nature is alive.

Another popular park is **Taman Tugu**, which is now a familiar landmark in the city after its opening in 2018. There is a network of trails around the park that's great for hiking. It takes around 45 minutes to cover all the trails.



A walk in this park gives one a panoramic view of Kuala Lumpur city, which is spectacular at the break of dawn. There's an observation tower to take it all in.

But the primary offering of this park is the space for kite flyers to enjoy their hobby, unhindered by power lines or rooftops.



Over 70 bird species, including hornbills, are found here.

Over 5,000 trees in the park have been labelled to give visitors an insight into their features, habitat and usage.



There is also a track for remote-controlled car racing, and a seating area for spectators watching the race.
