Clean-up underway at KL historical buildings

SELANGOR government's investment arm Menteri Besar Incorporated (MBI) has initiated clean-up efforts at two historical buildings located in the heart of Kuala Lumpur's heritage zone.

Contractors were seen driving a crane into the courtvards of both buildings recently, presumably to carry out the clean-up work.

At the Industrial Court building, workers were seen pulling out shrubs and weeds growing on top of the buildings, while over at the old Chartered Bank building a few hundred metres away, a man was spotted on a ladder carrying out cleaning work.

Both buildings are more than 100 years old and are gazetted National Heritage buildings.

Referring to the buildings as "The Court" and "Selangor House" respectively, MBI said both buildings, which were their assets. would be turned into tourist information centres to highlight Selangor's historical and unique attractions.

MBI aims to open them by the end of next year.

Jane Rai, who leads Free Walk Kuala Lumpur Unscripted which is a heritage walking tour of the country's capital city, said she was excited to see the two historical



buildings being cleaned up.

"We have always been interested in exploring new heritage buildings in the city and we cannot wait to include these two buildings in our future tours," she said.

She added that the buildings were in a sorry state for many years and was now looking forward to seeing them back to their former glory.

The old Chartered Bank building

was built in 1891 to house the Chartered Bank of India, Australia and China (later known as The Chartered Bank). A new three-storey building replaced the old one in 1909.

The Industrial Court building was built in 1905 and housed Chow Kit & Company, a department store catering to European women. The department store closed down during World War II.

Over the years, the building housed several government agencies, including the Election Commission and Registrar of Societies.

The building was renovated and restored in 1982 and temporarily housed the Industrial court before it moved out in 2017.
