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10% waste increase in KL from bazaars

Twice daily rubbish collection employed while S'gor sticks to once-a-day routine

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DOMESTIC waste in Kuala Lumpur is expected to increase by 10% this month because of the presence of Ramadan bazaars, says Alam Flora Sdn Bhd.

Alam Flora chief operating officer Azahari Zainal Abidin said the increase in domestic waste was expected based on previous years' figures.

He said cleaning works at Ramadan bazaars had been stepped up to ensure orderliness and hygiene before traders start business and after they close shop.

"Although many people are not eating and drinking during the day, they tend to buy more food for the break of fast.

"This increase in consumption is resulting in an uptick in the amount of plastic and paper waste being generated," he told *StarMetro*.

Azahari said rubbish collection at 93 bazaars in Kuala Lumpur would be done twice daily — between 3pm and 3.30pm and from 8pm to 10pm — to cater to the higher waste production.

"We have placed several 240 litre bins at these bazaars for traders' use.

"RoRo (roll-on roll off) bins are provided at larger bazaars, subject to Kuala Lumpur City Hall's (DBKL) request.

"These bins can only be placed at certain bazaars as they require a bigger space," he added.

Azahari reminded hawkers not to discard food waste such as used cooking oil and plastic wrappings into drains, in order to prevent blockage.

"We have noticed this problem is happening although it is not widespread.

"Such irresponsible behaviour raises flood risks, especially during a downpour," he stressed.

DBKL, in a statement to *StarMetro*, said bazaar traders were advised to place rubbish in plastic bags before throwing them out.

"A collection schedule has been drawn up with the Solid Waste Management and Public Cleansing Corporation and collection will be carried out by Alam Flora," it added.

In Selangor, several councils said KDEB Waste Management cleaned and collected

rubbish once a day after the bazaars shut operations.

Subang Jaya City Council (MBSJ) said cleaning works, at 18 sites under its jurisdiction, started at 9pm and ended before midnight daily.

"No RoRo bins are provided as the rubbish is collected by trucks," said MBSJ Corporate and Strategic Management Department deputy director Azfarizal Abdul Rashid.

Selayang Municipal Council, which oversees 28 bazaars this year, said rubbish collection must be done before midnight every day.

Its Corporate Department deputy director Ahmad Fauzi Ishak said bazaar organisers had to ensure that rubbish was put in one designated spot for KDEB workers to pick up.
