THE newly established Federal Territories Youth Assembly or Sidang Belia Wilayah Persekutuan (SBWP) is aimed at giving youths an avenue for their voice to be heard.

This new initiative brings together young individuals to discuss policy proposals affecting Kuala Lumpur, Putrajaya and Labuan.

Dr Zaliha explained that while the SBWP resembled the youth parliament programme, it differed by focusing specifically on issues within the Federal Territories.
