Keramat Mall to have new wet market, car park

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KUALA LUMPUR: The controversy surrounding the Keramat Mall market complex is finally resolved, allaying earlier fears that it will become another white elephant in the city.

After months of delay, the hawkers and petty traders from the existing Datuk Keramat market have agreed to move into the new market complex — but it will cost the government an additional RM15 million.

This is because a separate block will be built to house the wet market and a four-storey elevated car park.

"The proposed block is an

extension to the completed Keramat Mall and it is expected to be completed in three years," said Federal Territories Minister Datuk Raja Nong Chik Raja Zainal Abidin after chairing a meeting with representatives of the Datuk Keramat Hawkers and Petty Traders Association at City Hall headquarters.

Chis time around, the Datuk Keramat Hawkers and Petty Traders Association will be directly involved in the de-

sign and planning," said Raja Nong Chik.

It was reported that members of the association were upset as they were not consulted prior to the construction of the RM70 million building located opposite the Damai light rail transit station.

They had refused to move into the complex, claiming that the facilities at the new complex were inadequate, including the service lifts and loading bays.

Raja Nong Chik said the additional cost would include the acquisition of land for the annexe.

The retail space in the complex which had earlier been earmarked for the traders from the wet market will now be occupied by traders selling products like handicraft.

Apart from the 124 lots targeted for the wet market, the complex also houses 190 stalls, a foodcourt, a multipurpose hall and 256 parking bays.

Raja Nong Chik said the stalls, foodcourt and multipurpose hall will operate by the end of the year.

Meanwhile, association chairman Shoid Chee was happy with the outcome of the meeting.
